

Livestock's Impact in South Dakota

DID YOU KNOW?

- Annually 1.8 billion pounds of milk is produced in South Dakota.
- There are about 3.7 million head of cattle in South Dakota this equates to about 4.5 head of cattle for every person in the state.
- In 2008, South Dakota fed 83 million bushels of corn to livestock in the state.
- The production of ethanol used 291 million bushels of corn last year.
- South Dakota hogs consume 28.8 million bushels of corn and 7.1 million bushels of soybeans annually.

The leading crops in Tripp County are hay and haylage, grass silage, and greenchop and wheat. 333,300 tons of hay and haylage, grass silage, and greenchop were harvested on 141,080 acres and 4,847,000 bushels of wheat were harvested on 88,921 acres in Tripp County. The market value of all crops sold in Tripp County equals **\$44,113,000**.

All livestock operations of 1,000 Animal Units (AU) or more must meet or exceed all state regulations, established by the DENR. In addition, each county may establish regulations through their local zoning plan.

1,000 AU = 1,000 beef cattle, 700 dairy cows or 2,400 feeder-to-finish hogs.

Soybean Production – In 2009 the South Dakota soybean crop was just over 175 million bushels on 4.2 million acres for an average of 42 bushels per acre. The nation's largest farmer owned soybean processing plant in Volga produces 600,000 tons of soybean meal each year as well 40 million gallons of soybean oil.

Livestock Production a Viable Option for South Dakota Farm Families

The average annual living expenses for a family of four in South Dakota are nearly \$40,000, but the average annual net income from farm and ranch activities in South Dakota is only \$31,169. In order for South Dakota's farm and ranch families to make a living farming full-time, we must allow and encourage these families to grow their businesses.

Many families are also welcoming home high-school and college graduates who want to return to the farm. With farm land prices at record highs, livestock production is a more feasible way to incorporate returning children and their young families into the family farm.

South Dakota has an abundance of land, feed resources, and dedicated farm families to continue to be a national leader in livestock production. Let's not promote poverty by fighting against South Dakota's farm and ranch families who want to expand the life they love. Rather, let's promote prosperity by appreciating and supporting them as they produce food for the world while investing in South Dakota's future.

Please note: Lancaster County in Pennsylvania has almost **500** people per square mile while Tripp County has only **2**. However, Lancaster County also has a tremendous livestock population; they have **2** times more cattle than Tripp County. In Sioux County, Iowa the population is larger than 63 of the 66 in South Dakota, yet they have over half as many hogs as the entire state of South Dakota
